## Wells Hall - E. Lansing, MI

Today, Wells Hall is the largest academic building on campus (and still expanding). However, the Wells Hall you've probably had a class in at some point in your MSU career is actually the third hall to bear that name. The first Wells Hall was built in 1877, a year after the college's first dormitory (now known as Saints' Rest) burnt down. Wells Hall became the main dormitory on campus and stood where the Library stands today.

## General Project Scope

Homrich was contracted to perform the selective demolition and abatement at Wells Hall on the Michigan States University Campus. Some key factors for the project are:

- 29,000 sq. ft. selective demolition of existing lecture halls and structural components to allow for expansion.
- Abatement of pipe, fittings and floor tile.
- Due to the tight confines of the project and leading edge work (fall hazards), Homrich utilized a demolition robot that is controlled remotely from a safe vantage point.
- Homrich was contracted to salvage approximately 1400 lecture seats and store them off site for future use.
- Homrich also had to salvage several miscellaneous items for the owner to be used at a later date.
- Installed shoring and bracing so opening could be cut to allow for new structural steel placement.



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
